AROO Board Member and membership officer Erik Roe received the following email recently. We love fan mail:



The 2013 AROO rally season got off to a fine start on March 2 with the annual Rally School, held this year at the Lucky Lab on Hawthorne. Students ranged from many newcomers with no rally experience to several veterans who were there to sharpen their skills. After a brief welcoming and belated awarding of last year's first place AROO Cup to Yulia, Reid Trummel took the class through the General Instructions. The "GIs" set out the definitions, timing and distance standards, equipment limitations and every other aspect of the TSD rallies we do—they are the rules, and need to be understood in detail. Reid did a

great job walking the class through their intricacies. Next up, the class went on a "rally by PowerPoint" with photographic examples of many of the applications of the rules that rallyists need to make during a rally. They are a lot easier to grasp the first time in a classroom than on the road! Russ Kraushaar next gave his version of "Driving to Win." Since Russ has won many rallies, this was a particularly anticipated section of the class and Russ did not disappoint. Yulia Smolyansky (the current AROO Cup holder for navigation) covered "Navigating to Win," this year focusing on tips and tricks, rather than the details of rally math. *continued*

Fred and Lisa McNabb wrapped things up with "Rallying for Fun," for those who were not yet thinking about winning, but just making it back to lunch and being on speaking terms with their teammate. In fact, many of the class sections included advice on teamwork and maintaining in-car peace.

The next day, the AROO Cup Rally Series started, giving everyone a chance to test their driving, navigating, and personal relationship skills. Being titled "Baby Steps," it was designed to be an easy intro for newcomers and a re-entry for more practiced hands. Thirteen teams gathered at the Sylvan Zoo House on Sunday morning. Weather was decent and the field was diverse with a De Tomaso Pantera, a Lancia Fulvia Sport, an MG Midget, a TR6 and couple of Porsches, among others. The lone Alfa was driven by timing control volunteer Bill Haines and his able assistant, Pam.

After the odo calibration run out to North Plains, the course looped south with Sue and Bill Colisch in their Nissan, and Bob and Donna McNabb in their Acura each scoring a single penalty point, Fred and Lisa in their BMW and Doug Naef and Christine Merris right behind at 2 seconds off perfection.

The next regularity ran briefly up Pumpkin Ridge and back down the other side. Simon and Karen Levear in their borrowed TR6 got a point, Ed Godshalk and Rick Warner scored 3 in the Lancia, father/daughter team Gary Eddings and Kathryn Sherrell, chilly in their top-down Midget, got 4, while Lynn Gibner and Linda Guthrie rounded out the single digit pack in a Porsche Boxster with 5.

After a brief break, the course headed east. All but two cars hit the timing control at Jackson Quarry in single digits, which was very impressive. The last regularity encountered some Sunday morning congestion, necessitating time declarations by several teams. Besting this section were Rick Martin driving his Pantera with Yulia navigating for a single penalty point, Fred and Lisa and Lynn and Linda at 2 each, Bill and Sue with 3, Ed and Rick at 6, and Simon and Karen with a 9.

With the top five teams in a seven-second spread, it was definitely a competitive day. However, Bill and Sue won it at 18 total points, Fred and Lisa were second with 19 (without using time decs!), and Ed and Rick were third with 21. (Results are different from those announced at the awards lunch.) Complete results are in the table below.

So the AROO Cup Rally Series is off and running. It's not too late to join us, so if you are interested in participating in this fun and challenging motor sport, be sure to show up on April 7 for the second installment.

AROO Summer Tour, June 22-23 by Tom McGirr

FUTURE EVENTS

This will be like no other Alfa tour in recent memory (at least in my memory, what's left of it!). While it will have some nice roads that will be new to many, it will really be a leisurely journey through Oregon history. Tour mileage will be less than 100 miles per day.

Did you know the first settler in Canby arrived in 1838? Ever been to Butteville? It was named by French trappers in 1821. The oldest operating store in Oregon (established in 1863) is located here and we will stop for a visit! While I have been through Aurora many times, I had no idea of its past. It was established in 1856 as a religious utopian community. Known for their quality products, good food, hospitality and music, it attracted four train loads of visitors *every day!* Ever seen those big concrete buildings out in the country along the railroad tracks? They were booster stations for the Oregon Electric RR which had a network of lines from Portland down to Eugene.

The first day of the tour will start near Canby and pass through Barlow, Aurora, Butteville, Champoeg, Donald, Dayton, Monmouth and Independence. In addition to looking at many historic structures dating back to the 1850s, we will check out a number of local museums that do an excellent job of explaining the history of these communities. In Aurora, the curator of the museum will guide us through time, and volunteers will demonstrate some of the trades practiced at the time.

Day two will begin in Albany which was founded in 1845. After a driving tour through the three historic districts, we explore some long-forgotten communities including Pirtle, Orleans, Oakville, Fayetteville and Boston. In "Boston," we will tour the old grist mill and actually get to see the water-powered equipment in action.

After a short visit to the Shedd Museum, we stop in Harrisburg (originally founded in 1853) at the old ferryboat landing. Looking at the Willamette River today, it is hard to fathom that steamboats made it from Portland all the way down to Harrisburg. The tour will end up in historic Brownsville. Again, many of us have been through this quaint town (several of my tours have stopped at the park) but if you are like me, you have not taken the time to explore it. This time we will drive by some of the oldest homes, check out their museum and the wonderfully preserved Moyer House, all after having a burger and beverage at the Brownsville Saloon.

I hope you can join us for both days, but the tour is designed so you can elect to participate in only one. I have located a good Italian restaurant in Albany for those who would like to join us for the overnight version. The Comfort Suites in Albany has reasonable lodging and is where I will be staying the night. There are lots of other motels in the area as well.

I will need a head count for both days so I can make arrangements at the museums and restaurants. My e-mail is mcgirrt@wcb.com. I would recommend you call the motel to make a reservation if you are going to stay overnight. When calling Albany Comfort Suites (541-917-6144), identify yourself as part of the Alfa Romeo club. We have a special rate of only \$89. Room block will expire June 3.

And for those who might be longing for more of a "road trip," stay tuned for the Fall Tour, September 7-8.


Introduction of the Alfa Romeo 4C

Alfa Romeo CEO Harald J. Wester presents the new Alfa Romeo 4C at the 2013 Geneva International Motor Show. It weighs only 895 kg (a little less than 2,000 lbs.). Its 1750cc turbo-charged engine produces 240 hp. Its price in the USA is yet to be announced, but in Europe the price tag reads €60,000, or about \$78,000. 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
