

Alfas grew, Alfa fans — known as "Alfisti" — began to gather at Rambo Motors, the new Alfa dealer in Portland, which trained mechanics and supported a racing team. In the early 1960s, Bob Rinde, Rambo's sales manager, joined the national Alfa Romeo Owners Club and others followed. By October 1968 there was enough local interest for Bob McGill to apply to start a chapter, making AROO the sixth AROC-US chapter.

Alfa Bits President's Column - October 2016 - Doug Zaitz

Fall is in the air, once again. Here in Eastern Washington State, namely in Spokanistan as I refer to it, that means impending snow and ice... This weekend the snow tires get installed on the daily driver, before the annual onslaught of local procrastinators. What I'd give for thirty-five inches of rain a year instead!

In the spirit of volunteerism, I stepped forward to write this month's Alfa Bits column. In order to lessen the stress of the office of President, each of AROO's Board of Directors members volunteers to write a monthly column, with several members usually writing one additional during the course of the year. It's not a heavy burden, and it certainly makes the position of President more tolerable (saleable?) as well. I am more than happy to help out!

Speaking of volunteerism, this month AROO honors its member volunteers with a free dinner celebration to all volunteers who attend. This club and its wide-ranging activities can only exist with such motivated volunteers – it is you, our club members who make this club fun, and give us reason to participate. Thank you for participating and for volunteering! See you at Ernesto's on Sunday, October 16th at 5:30 pm. Heck, I'm no fool – why not drive over 750 miles round trip for a free dinner with friends?

This month's General Membership meeting will be on Wednesday, October 19th. I will be there, as I <again> volunteered... This month's program will be some words and a slide show about my recent trip to Italy (this September; the jet lag has just subsided) as I participated in the 2016 Car Guy Tour (CGT).

The CGT, brainchild of former Maserati International Enterprises (MIE) and Concorso Italiano Frank Mandarano, is an annual event, usually conducted in September for 10-12 days. Frank knows all the right people, and is able to fill those days full with opportunities whose significance usually doesn't sink in until weeks or months later ~

We were able to tour the Lamborghini factory, both Maserati factories, the Ferrari factory, the Pagani factory, and the Abarth assembly plant and restoration shop. We visited several Ferrari museums, the Alfa Romeo museum, the Fiat (FCA) corporate museum, and the National Automobile Museum in Torino.

We visited several supplier factories, such as Modena Auto Sport (which supplies many Ferrari engine parts), as well as Schedoni leather and

Borrani wire wheels. And to top that off we visited several private collections, including the Panini Maserati collection and the incredible Mario Righini collection (with the first and only surviving Ferrari-built Auto Avio Costruzioni Tipo 815).

And lastly we were able to visit several restoration shops and several significant design studios, such as Pininfarina (have you seen their new soft drink vending machines at Mickey-D's?), Ital Design (Giugiaro, now owned by VW), Tom Tjaarda Design (Fiat 124 Spyder and Pantera), and ED (Mike Robinson) Design.

After nearly two weeks of Italian car gluttony, I relaxed for five days in the Piemonte region of Italy (northwest), with day trips to Genova, Pisa, Alba and Monaco (never have I seen so many Bentleys in one place!) Cortemilia, nestled in the Langhe Hills district of the Piemonte, region, is well-known for its truffles (the fungus kind) and hazelnuts (the gelato kind), and it is the center of the world for grand Italian red wines (Barolo, Nebbiolo, Barbera, Barbersco). I then spent two days near Brescia, taking in the Mille Miglia museum and marveling in the Roman ruins at the Santa Giulia museum.

A bit of background - my personal obsession with Italy began nearly 40 years ago, when per chance I was a foreign exchange student, studying in Italy for a full year. Upon my arrival as a naïve 18 year old, I spoke no Italian, having studied German in high school. The Italian language was only one of three major barriers I faced, with the Italian culture being the second, and the third of me being a very naïve American, unknowning of the world outside of our "Lower 48".

Now 40 years later, I own too many (non-operational) Italian cars, enjoy Italian foods and wines, and make frequent vacation trips to the "Bel Paese". I wouldn't have it any other way! I now understood how things work in Italy, and really enjoy showing others the side of Italy that is so rare for foreigners to truly appreciate.

As many of you are now aware, AROC-USA will sponsor the "AROC Goes to Italy" tour in May of 2017. I am planning to attend, along with a few of our local AROO members. While the 2017 tour is now sold out, a second tour is being planned for May of 2018. Please give it a thought – if you haven't been to Italy, this would be an excellent introduction to experience some of the better car events and attractions, and a wonderful opportunity to be introduced to Italian culture and style as well.

Please join us on Wednesday the 19th for an evening of friends, food, good wine and a few tall tales about Italy -- see you there!

Accordingly, please mark your



The interior arrangement of the Giulietta Spider is an appealing composition of sober elegance.

An upholstered shade profects the control panel against possible reflections. All control instruments are grouped on three dials which can be consulted at one glance.

SUMMER TOUR AN INTERNATIONAL AFFAIR!

The summer tour to Wallowa Lake tour was my first "international" tour as I had guests come down from Vancouver BC to attend! However, they did not get the "Furthest Travel" award...that went to Todd and Cathy Stedman, who sent their Alfa out from OHIO to attend. They will be eventually moving to Seattle and hope to participate in both Washington and Oregon Alfa events. A close second went to two fellows how drove up from San Diego in their 1972 Ferrari. They also went on my Yellowstone trip earlier this summer in a 1972 Daytona (guess they did not get enough miles in).

About half the group gathered up at Government Camp the night before to save a little drive time the next day. Good food and spirits were enjoyed at the Mt. Hood Brewery.

The next morning, Michele Rand got the threatened Yugo nametag. Folks that had not

submitted picture of their driving machine so I could make their nametag were advised they were at risk. Last time Michelle went on a tour with me, she literally went through her barn full of cars trying to find one that would start...so I was not surprised. This time she brought a beautiful yellow 73 Datsun 2000 Fairlady....very rare.

We lost our first car before we left Government Camp. Chuck and Deneice Essex, of Salem, noticed fluid coming out from their Boxster. They were kind in shock as on the last tour they attended with me their water pump failed out in the John Day Fossil Beds. The good news was that AAA towed their car to Bend and the dealer was able to repair the leaking power steering O-ring and the made it to Baker City the same day.



Fearless leader (that be me) also had a panic attack about two miles into the trip. Engine light came started to come on for extended periods of time despite the car running great. In that all the fluids were good and no over heating, etc, I finally was able to put it on a "have Nasko check it out" list and finished the tour with no problems.

As we pulled into Maupin City Park, the second casualty occurred. The Colgan's 67 Sunbeam Tiger came coasting in with a horrible sounding engine. Best guess was they had a bad valve. AAA got their second call and (surprise!), they responded in just 15 minutes....in MAUPIN! They also returned the tour the next day...alas...in a Camry.

After the traditional rest stop in the John Day Fossil Beds east of Antelope, we had lunch in a nice park in Spray Oregon along the John Day River. All participated in a short walk among the fossil beds before visiting the Paleontology Museum. Those that had not visited the Sumpter Dredge Park learned about the mining methods used in the early 1900's.

Dinner was at Barley Browns Tavern in Baker City. If you have not stopped there before, do so! Good food and very good beer. We were fortunate they reserved a section for us as they were packed and had a waiting line.

The next day we were off to the Oregon Trail Museum, Hells Canyon Overlook and Wallowa Lake. We allocated about an hour at the museum, which was fine (Continued next page)

for us that had been there before but not enough for the first timers. Funny how one always seems to see or read something that we missed before.

Many had not been to Hells Canyon Overlook. It is pretty spectacular. I need to try to get to the Idaho side sometime as some say it is even a better view. Lunch was in a very peacefully forest service campground we had to ourselves.

The stay at the Wallowa Lake Lodge was delightful and VERY relaxed, as you can see from the pictures! The food was pretty good (with the exception of the salmon-dry/cold/tough-did I say dry?), especially the HUGE breakfasts. Maybe foolish to order fish in the middle of nowhere. We had our own pianist both nights (she was actually quite accomplished!).

All but one poor soul that is afraid of heights made the tram ride to the top of Mt. Howard.

Although I was there by 8:50 am to get our tickets, it was almost 9:30 before we boarded. The lady who usually ran the booth did not show up and the 'men' who ran the tram had no clue how to get the laptop to connect to the ticket machine. I finally convinced them to just take my Visa number down and worry about the tickets later.

Being one of the highest points around, there is a 'jump off aka you have to be frinken out of your mind' ledge for folks who think man was intended to fly. Would take a double dose of faith as there was nothing but boulders beneath the jumping point. It was clear enough to see the Sawtooth Mtns in Idaho from the top.

I organized a private tour at Valley Bronze in Joseph Saturday afternoon. All that partook said it was fascinating.

Sunday we ventured on to the Condon Hotel. I actually found a road that Fred and Lisa had NOT been on (I consider that a real accomplishment) that headed up to lone and back down. In that my other half wanted to visit the county historical museum in Condon that afternoon, Fred led most of the pack on the new road. He must have been happy as reports of 80-90 mph were reported. Speaking of the museum, it really is a GREAT display of local history. We really recommend it to those who are in the area when it is open.

Monday the rank thinned out as some left early for home. Those that continued on enjoyed the Old McKenzie Pass and Sahalie Falls. Ted Freres, an Alfa Wannabe member, gave us a tour of his family owned veneer plant (Freres Lumber Co). I

knew that mills were mechanized, but I was truly blown away at what machines can do. One machine stripped the trees, sent strips down a belt which, in turn, graded the veneer into 6 grades via laser thereby sending the sheets to six different destinations which, in turn, were measured for water content and again resorted after going through a 350 degree furnace. The other



interesting thing I learned was that there is virtually NO waste. I had originally thought that that meant sweeping the sawdust and selling it for mulch. No more. The waste goes into a special furnace that generates electricity sold back to the grid. Thanks Ted for a great tour (his Corvette was pretty cool as well).

All in all, everything went off without a major hitch. Nice mix of cars, nice mix of people, just a really nice tour. Consider joining me on one of my adventures in 2017.


