ABOUT AROO

In the late 1950s, two Giulietta Spider Veloce's came to Portland. They were featured on a local TV show to promote a sports car race

which they dominated, winning converts in the growing sports car scene. As interest and knowledge of Alfas grew, Alfa fans — known as "Alfisti" — began to gather at Rambo Motors, the new Alfa dealer in Portland, which trained mechanics and supported a racing team. In the early 1960s, Bob Rinde, Rambo's sales manager, joined the national Alfa Romeo Owners Club and others followed. By October 1968 there was enough local interest for Bob McGill to apply to start a chapter, making AROO the sixth AROC-US chapter.

ALFA ROMEOS IN HUNGARY



Alfa Romeo were faster than McLaren in Hungary says Raikkonen

There were contrasting fortunes for the Alfa Romeos in Hungary. Kimi Raikkonen was pleased with seventh and pace that he reckons bettered McLaren's in the early stages. As for Antonio Giovinazzi, his disappointment was plain to see.

Raikkonen was in the top 10 for each of the practice sessions in Hungary so it was perhaps no surprise to see him line-up 10th on the grid. That became P7 inside five laps.

A pit stop on lap 29 had him emerge just behind Red Bull's Pierre Gasly, and for the last five laps the Finn was right on Gasly's tail. He just couldn't make the pass on the narrow bends of Hungary. Raikkonen, though, was pretty pleased with the car's performance, saying it was better than McLaren, who had Carlos Sainz finish to places up the road in fifth.

"Well, that was quite good," said Raikkonen of his race. "The car behaved great, I did a good job in the first lap and stayed out of trouble and then we had even better speed than the McLaren, but it was impossible to overtake.

"After the pit stop we knew that it was impossible to overtake and I had to save the tyres for the end, and we lost a position in the pit stop then gained one [due to Nico Hulkenberg's Renault being stuck in safe mode], maybe the only thing we could've done better is stop a lap earlier, but that's how it goes," he concluded.

"Seventh was all we could hope for today so we can be satisfied with these points," said Vasseur.

That McLaren-esque pace is promising for the team ranked seventh in the standings, considering their British rivals are riding high in fourth in the constructors' championship.

However, life isn't so good on the other side of the garage as Antonio Giovinazzi's race wasn't quite as successful. The rookie called it "very disappointing" after he was squeezed between the Racing Point of Lance Stroll and the Williams of Robert Kubica through Turn 1 on the opening lap.

"I had contact on the opening lap, when I was squeezed between two cars at Turn 1, and I had an issue with my first set of tyres that meant I had to cut my first stint much shorter than we were planning," he said. "It was a shame to end the first part of the season like this, especially because we had shown good pace in recent races, but it was another day in which we didn't manage to turn our potential into points."

Divergent outcomes for the pair, then, with Team Principal Frederic Vasseur called it a "race of two halves," praising Raikkonen for holding off Mercedes' Valtteri Bottas in the last few laps.

The ultimate hypercut from the start of the Hungarian Grand Prix

"Seventh was all we could hope for today so we can be satisfied with these points," said Vasseur. "As for Antonio, starting in P17 meant he was always going to struggle on this track, and an issue with his first set of tyres meant he didn't get the chance to make any progress in the race.

For Alfa Romeo, the race was characteristic of their season so far, Giovinazzi still 18th in the standings, and Raikkonen eighth having taken all but one of the team's 32 points this season. As for Giovinazzi's form, the team will be hoping things improve.

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
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

Limited space at scenic stop and lunch arrangements will cap entries to not much more that 20 cars. Advanced reservations appreciated. We hope not to turn anyone away.



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2020 Wannabe Tour Canada

2020 Alfa Wannabe Tour Canada

Hello Alfa Wannabe's,

2020 tour will be going to Canada. There was a large preference for this tour over the suggested trip to the SW National parks due in part to the two days + each way to get to the parks.

I have secured a room block for the Fairmont Chateau Lake Louise for two nights, which was the key to moving forward. While I had hoped to stay one night at Moraine Lake Lodge, they do not take large group reservations. However, there are shuttles that take folks to and from Lake Louise and Lake Moraine so we will still be able to take a day trip to visit this special place. Staying two days at the hotel will give us ample time to explore the area trails and partake in other activities available around the area without fighting all the parking problems in the area.



I have also backed up the date of the trip to June 21-June 28. I learned that often the snow remains at Lake Louise until the first week of June, which would have greatly limited access to the trails in the area. I was unable to secure rooms for the 3rd week so the 4th week of June it is! While this will mean a few more visitors to compete with, the good thing is there is a much better chance the waters of Lake Louise will be that beautiful agua color.

Below is a revised itinerary for the trip which is

somewhat different from originally outlined and *eliminates* duplications from the 2017 Canada trip except for a night in Spokane.

Day 1-Back roads to Spokane-Lodging at the Historic Davenport Hotel.



Day 2-Fairmount Hot Springs Resort. We arrive early afternoon to enjoy the springs.

Day 3- Rim Rock Lodge in Banff. The drive will include views of Kootenay Valley, the Paint Pots, a short hike to see Marble Canyon, Vermillion Pass (Continental Divide) and Vermillion Lakes. We will take the Banff Gondola to the top of Sulfur Mountain for lunch while enjoying stunning views of Banff and the surrounding mountains. After lunch, we will soak in Banff Upper Hot Springs then check in to our hotel.

Day 4: On the way to Chateau Lake Louise, our route will include a scenic drive around Banff including Sunrise Corner, Tunnel Mountain, Hoodoos Viewpoint,

Minnewanka Loop, a drive to the top of Mt. Norway and a hike into breathtaking Johnson Canyon. We arrive at Lake Louise early enough to explore some to the scenic trails around the lake in the afternoon.

Day 5: Our plan is to catch the shuttle to Moraine Lake for at least part of the day. From there, a variety of short to moderate hikes are available. We will either enjoy a box lunch on the trail or possibly have lunch at Moraine Lake Lodge. There are canoes available to rent on both Lake Moraine and Lake

Louise from which the views at opposites ends of the lakes are amazing.

Day 6: We drive the Ice Highway to the Fairmount Jasper Lodge located in Jasper. While not a long distance, we will take most of the day to explore the following: Peyto Lake, Columbia Ice Field, Sunwapta, Athabasca and Tangle Falls, Crowfoot Glacier, Saskistchewan Lookout, Herbert Lake and Mistaya Canyon.

Day 7: We will drive to Miette Hot Springs for a soak, then drive to Kamloops where we will stay Sun Peaks Resort located at the ski resort in the mountains.

Day 8: Off to Harrison Hot Springs Resort.


Day 9: Home bound. I have 18 couples who have expressed interest in the Canada trip. *Please reconfirm*. If you voiced a desire to go to the National Parks only, but want to join this tour, let me know. Finally, if you have been sitting on the fence but would like to sign up, please let me know now! It will be diffi

I will need to pay a deposit of \$2,700 when I send in the Fairmount lodging contracts to secure the Lake Louise rooms by May 31. An additional deposit of \$13,891 is due September 1. Hence, please reconfirm (or indicate) your interest by Thursday May 30 and send me a deposit of \$1,000 to my attention c/o 3420 Dogwood Dr S, Salem OR 97302. I do not want to reserve too many rooms (I can cancel up to two rooms w/o penalty). Be advised it will be near impossible to add more rooms down the road. I will start working on the balance of the lodging upon my return from Africa in late June. I will let you know what additional deposit I will need thereafter.

I regret having to ask for deposits so far in advance but the hotels are in position to require partial payments due to the demand. While we could try to stay outside of Lake Louise, the horror stories I have read about in terms of traffic and non-existent parking has convinced me this is the way to go. The Fairmont gave us a very good deal (discount of around 23%) at both Lake Louise and Jasper.

OEM 9" 101 series tail light assembly restored. New tail light to body mounting gasket, a new lens gasket, all new SS hardware, and all new light bulbs. The lens is useable, though not pristine. One may notice that the signal portion of the lens isn't amber, it's red. It's the original stock lens.
