



# ABOUT AROO

In the late 1950s, two Giulietta Spider Veloce's came to Portland. They were featured on a local TV show to promote a sports car race

which they dominated, winning converts in the growing sports car scene. As interest and knowledge of Alfas grew, Alfa fans — known as "Alfisti" — began to gather at Rambo Motors, the new Alfa dealer in Portland, which trained mechanics and supported a racing team. In the early 1960s, Bob Rinde, Rambo's sales manager, joined the national Alfa Romeo Owners Club and others followed. By October 1968 there was enough local interest for Bob McGill to apply to start a chapter, making AROO the sixth AROC-US chapter.

# 2022 – A Year of Growing Our Membership

I just checked and we have more than 220 paid members (plus I know of a handful of folks who are active but a bit tardy in their renewals!). A 20+ percent increase is something to celebrate!

I wish we could point to a great new initiative or something dramatic that happened. New members have been steadily coming in organically for a variety of reasons. Here are a few trends that are at work:

Growth Outside of Portland – We are seeing new members joining from outside of the northern Willamette Valley. There has been a modest influx



# **Northwest Alfisti Tuner Grows**

Wes Ingram surely needs no introduction to most Northwest Alfisti, nor indeed to those across the world. Best known as the most knowledgeable rebuilders and tuners of the SPICA mechanical fuel injection system fitted to our four-cylinder cars from 1969-1982, Wes and his partner Herb Sanborn (who took over the SPICA rebuilds from Wes 20 years ago) also have considerable experience in building fast and well-handling Alfas. They offer a variety of tuning levels for both track and road cars; see the August 2020 issue of Iniezione for details of John Barchasch's "Silver Surfer" project, for example.

For the last several years Wes and Herb have been working out of a single-bay unit in an industrial area by the Skagit Regional Airport in Burlington, assisted by Wes' wife Rita (an ex-GTV racer herself!), Carl Freund (who helps with SPICA rebuilds) and George Rodgers-Clark (IT support). A couple of years ago they were joined by Bryce Noblat, who's proven to be a quick study both on the SPICA system and on engine builds in particular.

As you can imagine things were a bit cramped, and when a three-bay unit became available at the other end of their building, it was too good an opportunity to miss. Herb and Bryce planned and executed the move, a massive effort when you consider how much "stuff" naturally accumulates over the years! With the help of several Alfisti friends the relocation was completed in the late Spring, and operations are back in full swing. I went up to take a look.

First impressions are of a clean, tidy, well-organized operation, with room to work comfortably around each workstation. They built out office spaces (NWARC member Greg Miller helped with the rewiring), a conference/break room where they can discuss projects with customers away from interruptions, a clean room for engine building, and a "dirty" room for grinding, blasting and drilling operations. All these have heavily-reinforced ceilings to act as storage for SPICA units, engine blocks, spare body panels, etc.

In the far corner of the new space is the disassembly and cleaning area, the vital first step in any project. If you spend any time around Wes you will quickly learn that he hates dirt... Beyond that there will eventually be a small painting/powder coating area.

Specialist stations are equipped for SPICA rebuilding: one for the thermostatic actuators, one for intake manifolds, injector bodies and injection tubing, and another for matching the pump plungers and barrels. This exceedingly painstaking work has to be done by hand, feeling for just the right component fit; there's no practical way to measure them accurately enough to sort. Herb says that it helps to get into a Zen state to work through all the combinations, but it apparently also has the distinct chance of leading to insanity... Think of that while you're waiting for your pump to be rebuilt.

All assembled units are tested on a flow bench for anywhere from 3 days to 4 weeks, as final tweaking and component exchange make them as good as they can be for the specific engine tune requested.

In addition to SPICA units, they also work on Kugelfischer mechanical injection systems for BMW 2002s, but not on the Lucas or Bosch mechanical injection systems used on some Mercedes and Porsche 911 models; there are plenty of other specialists for those.

An equal volume of work these days comes from engine builds; these are mostly handled by Wes and Bryce, with assistance from Herb and Carl. All are dyno-tested before delivery and are shipped wherever needed. There's an increasing volume of work on customers' cars, too, from general suspension setup to any other mechanical restoration work they need.

As in any engineering shop, half the fun in visiting is seeing what projects they're up to. Given that Wes is an inveterate tinkerer and seeker of ways to improve things - with a background as a highly successful drag racer - it's no surprise to see that he's built his own dynamometer! It's based on an old boat trailer, with the engine load provided by a drag racing supercharger. Fully instrumented and calibrated, all engine builds are run on it before delivery.



And the project engine installed on it during my visit was especially interesting; Wes and Herb having fun building a hot-rod Alfa Montreal V8! This is uncharted territory and involves not only finding the right (and reliable) combination of compression ratio, cams and intake velocity headers, but also grinding an appropriate 3-D cam for the 8-cylinder SPICA injection pump! No-one else in the country has the knowledge even to attempt this, but there it is, running and being tested while they work out the best solutions. More on this when it's done.

Bryce is working on his own project - his first Alfa! He picked up the 1967 Giulia Super that was advertised in the newsletter a couple of months ago, one that hadn't run for 30 years but was in basically sound condition. There's a story here; it belonged to the landlord of the man who looks after NWARC member Kim Buty's Corvette. Said landlord had finally decided he wasn't going to do anything with it and asked his Corvette mechanic tenant for advice; Kim suggested he advertise it in the Iniezione. Bryce saw the ad, jumped on it, went down with a trailer and picked it up, then took it to surprise his friend who lived in the area - Kim Buty!

He plans to keep it looking mostly stock (it will be his daily driver) although it will have a hot 2.0 liter engine, slightly lowered suspension and maybe a couple of other Wes and Herb tweaks...

The future looks bright for the operation now that they have the space to take on more work and, soon, hire more staff. Many thanks to Wes, Herb, Rita and Bryce for taking the time to show me around, and good luck to all!



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
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
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
